General Information

The Claiming Full Citizenship: Self Determination, Personalization and Individualized Funding 2015 International Conference was held on October 15 -17, 2015 at The Hyatt Regency in Vancouver, British Columbia. The conference brought together a broad range of people from around the world to share experiences and dialogue to support the effective implementation of self-determination, personalization and individualized funding and ultimately to promote the full and effective citizenship of those who rely on formal and informal supports to participate to their full capacity. This conference brought together advocates, self-advocates, policy makers, government representatives, service providers, agency administrators, as well as researchers from around the world to share stories, current research, and network with like-minded leaders from all over the world.

Presentations included topics on individualized funding, social inclusion and accessibility, as well as examining policies and implementation strategies to improve the process of claiming full citizenship. Because of it being an international conference, individuals were able to get a real understanding of practices, policies, and models that were being used in different parts of the world. A highlight of this conference was the strong representation of self-advocates in all aspects of the conference.

The conference was presented by the Centre for Inclusion and Citizenship and UBC Interprofessional Continuing Education. The tone of the main conference was set during the opening remarks by conference chair Tim Stainton, Professor at the School of Social Work at UBC and Director of the Centre for Inclusion and Citizenship followed by the opening prayer by Cecilia Point from Musqueam First Nation. By the end of the conference, a total of 168 presenters and 24 poster presenters shared their knowledge with delegates.


The chart on the right illustrates the breakdown of main conference attendees by location.

It was clear from participants' feedback that the sessions they attended enabled them to extract new ideas, change their perspectives, and have a renewed motivation to create citizenship for all.

Participants also reported that they were inspired by self- advocates that shared their stories and experiences, and felt that it gave them a nudge to take on a greater role in their work, advocate harder, and push for change. Participants also reported that attending the conference made them much for comfortable in working with other community members, as well as reaching out to others around the globe when it came to working on new strategies and advocacy for individualized funding.

During the conference, the speakers from various fields not only shared their valuable expertise and experiences, but also had an open dialogue with the audience during facilitated Q&A periods. Because of the number of sessions at one time, there was a wide variety of options with at least one being suitable for each attendee.

Many delegates expressed their views about the excellent quality of the posters, which covered a wide range of themes and research areas. They appreciated the networking opportunity with professionals of a wide variety to gain perspective on an international scale.
